Red Rose Run

The 33rd Annual Red Rose Run will be held on Saturday, May 30, 2009 in Downtown Lancaster and is sponsored by Highmark Blue Shield. The hub of activity will take place at Binns Park and Lancaster Square, located on the 100 block of North Queen Street.

A 5-mile wheelchair race kicks off the morning at 8:25 a.m., followed by a 5-mile run at 8:30 a.m.. The 1-mile run/walk will begin at 8:35 a.m.. The Red Rose Run also offers opportunities for children, with a 600 meter loop race for children ages 7 and under and a 800 meter run for 8 to 10-year olds. Awards for the race will be presented at Binns Park beginning at 10:30 a.m.

Proceeds from this year's event will benefit the Boys and Girls Club of Lancaster and the Mayor's Office of Special Events. Volunteers are also needed to assist with registration and other day of race activities.
